This is not a catalogue of finished work. This is also not a report of our collaboration on climate imaginaries. Instead, this zine offers a peek into an ongoing collaboration between artists, designers and researchers who have jointly turned their attention to the rising ocean. In riso-printed\* collages, designers Carlo De Gaetano, Andy Dockett and Mariana Fernández Mora formulate their visual responses to the questions, insights and experiments we encounter on our journey.

Previous research has shown that before people can accept, let alone create, the change necessary for the climate crisis, they need to first be able to imagine life in a changing climate. How can one facilitate imagination between generations and across species, geographies and materialities? Or liberate the imagination from recurring tropes that suggest climate change is of the future, elsewhere, affecting others, when so many people worldwide already live its devastating impact?

These questions lie at the heart of our programme Climate Imaginaries at Sea. With the generous support of the NWA-arts route, CoECl and ARIAS, we will continue our work through artistic research studios that address global South, material and interspecies perspectives on climate change\*, striving to make waves.

# Drawing

Is water nice to me? Should it be? Should it be an ally, be sweet?

Sweet water is assuredly sweeter than its saltier sibling, more hospitable to kidneys of water-filled human bodies. What do we do if all the water turns salty? Salty waters run deep. 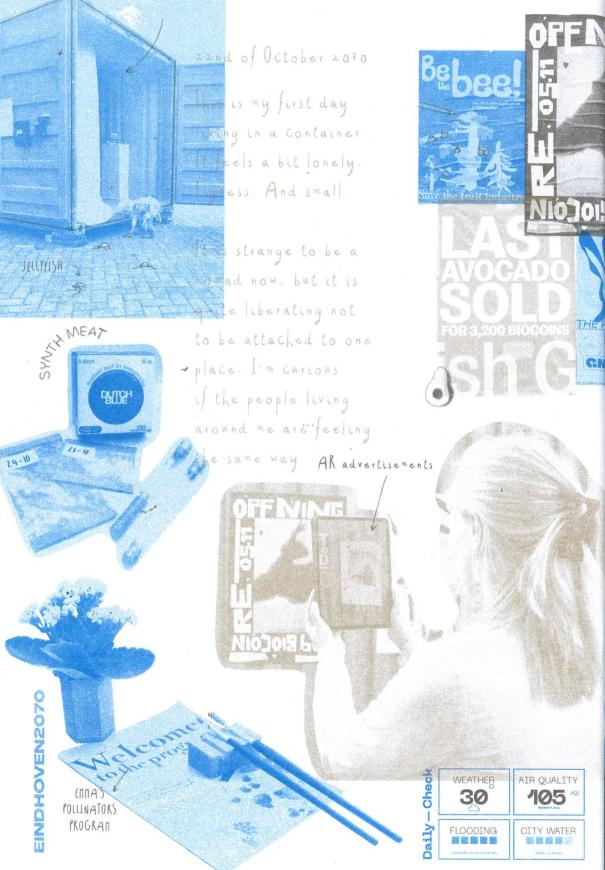
# Drawing Water ~

Students of architectural design collaborated with architect Anne Dessing and Art & Spatial Praxis, the research group of the Gerrit Rietveld Academie, to create the exhibition *Drawing Water*. The exhibition ran from November 18 to November 21, at the Water Studio of Tolhuistuin.

Water may be in plain sight, yet we may not always observe it with the depth it merits. Re-imagining water and opening ourselves to new ways of understanding its fluidity starts with paying attention.

The students experimented with capturing their notions of water. They also examined what instruments we have for drawing water, what media can be used, and how techniques cans be improved. Based on material study and investigations into historical imaginations of water, the students' work renegotiates their relationship with water, and hopes to challenge yours.

Anne Dessing is a Dutch architect, whose practice operates at the intersection of art and architecture. She uses the discipline's powerful representational techniques as tools to understand societies as complex aesthetic systems.

And so vast

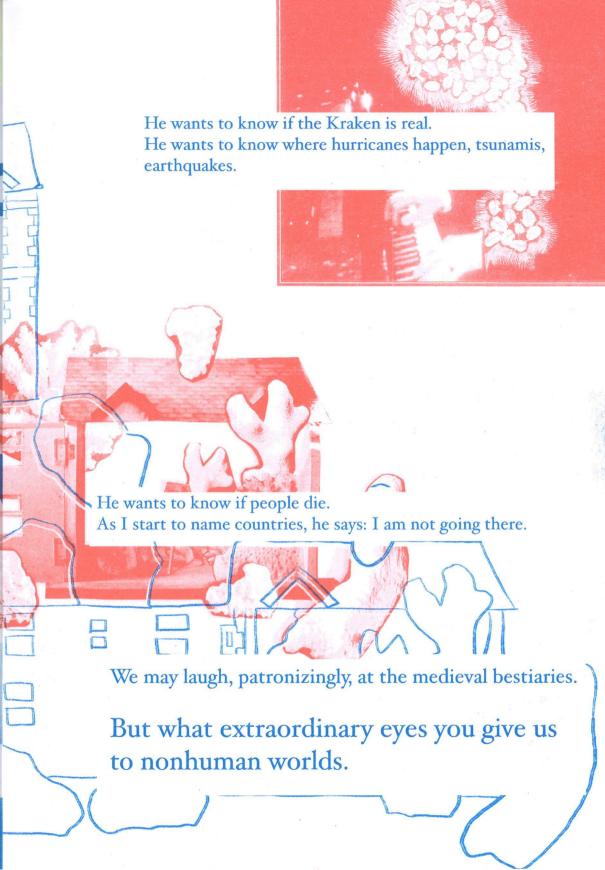
Or so small

Unnumbered and enormous polypi <sup>2</sup>



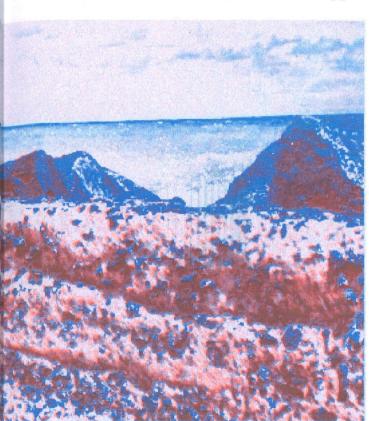

# SUB-ATLANTIC ABYSS

"with each crossing the more subaquatic I become my ears, seashells the ribs, gills. we're becoming fish and we are many".

This is another never-ending story. No hero. An outline of a storytelling about subverting physical and metaphysical margins. Diving. Just like thousands of stories invented every day under the debris and violence of the waters that drown lives when they bravely try to float or swim beyond the surfaces and borders imposed on them.



To those who are safe in their boats or bent upon reaching the mainland at last, nothing seems to be happening.

They are helpless to hear the underwater chatter.

They possess innumerable tools for expropriating the waters, but they can barely swim. Subverting compulsory rationality, the oceanic abyss is then a habitat to an infinity of beings dissenting from the norm.

The ocean reveals itself as a place through which a super-life emerges: a transcendence that sprouts beyond the linear, victorious, sharp and evident narratives that constitute the colonial imagination and its violent perspective on social life.

The verticality of the upright body disappears.

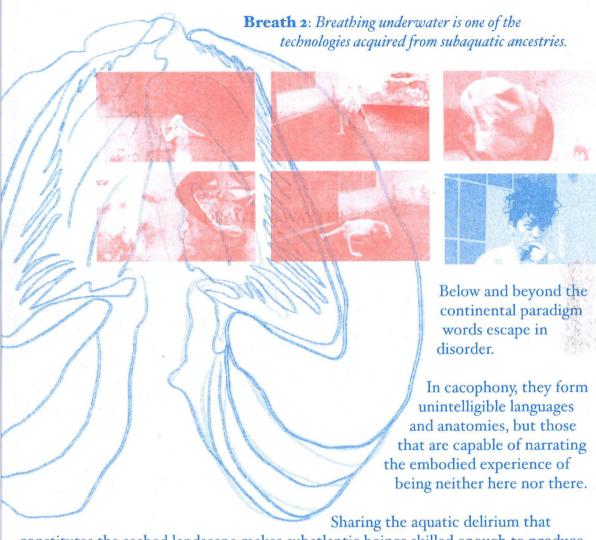
Underwater, it is possible to truly lose the feeling of weight. Over time, practice and wisdom, the pressure eases.

The universalism of a single language is unlikely to succeed.

Once submerged, the initial deafening silence gradually makes room inside the temples, which in turn become acoustic shells capable of listening to sounds from other times.

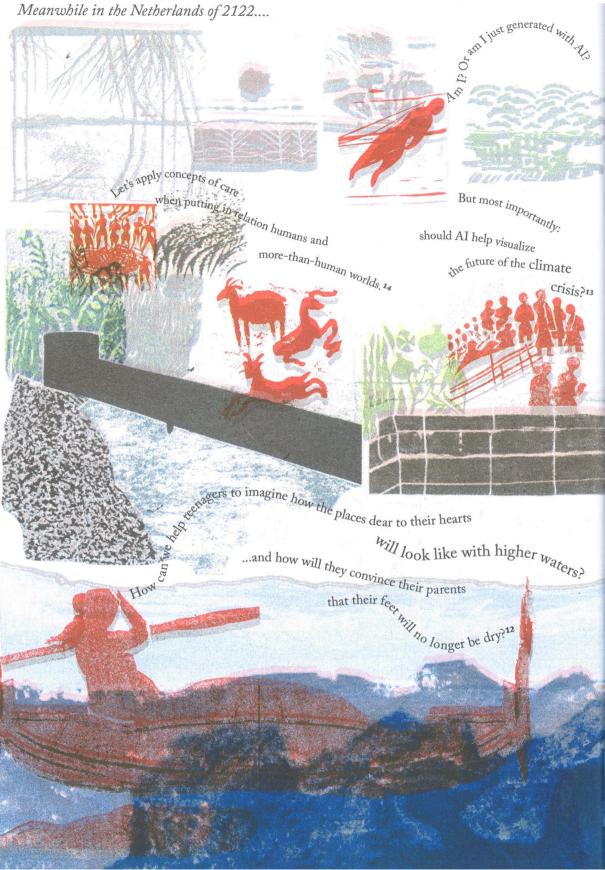
**Breath** 1: To live in the sub-atlantic abyss, there are voices you should not listen to. In the subatlantic abyss, it is also possible to open your eyes and let the corneas burn until you can see a hazy blur. A foggy landscape. In this undefined landscape live other sea creatures. Beings of various sizes and colours. They are thousands of types of lives that were thrown or voluntarily threw themselves into the abyss, whose creation is a strategy of those who consider themselves safe enough to divide one side from the other.

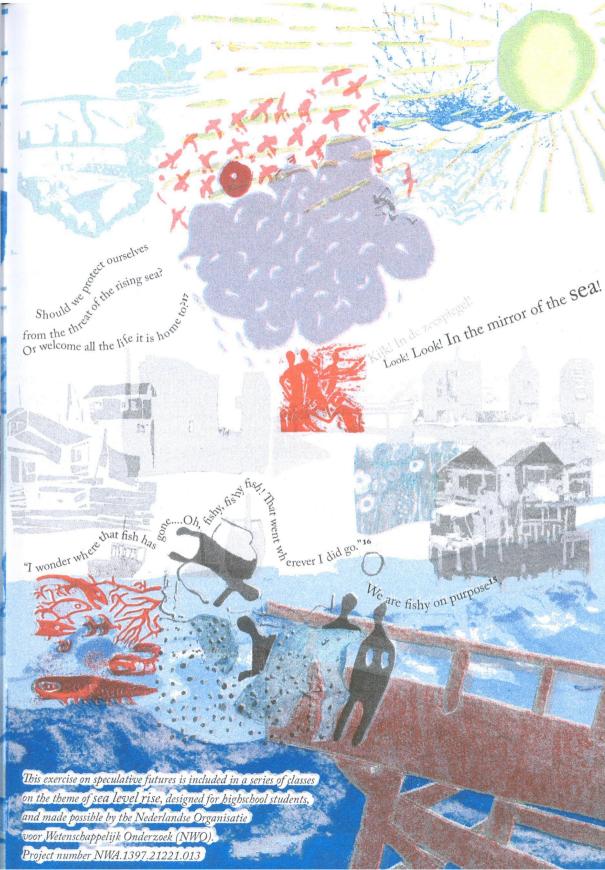
Whether it is to breach or to check out the glint of the sunlight, we already know that trying to swim on the surface is much more exhausting than holding your breath to dive. In the ocean, there is no linear direction. Time is definitely multidirectional, dense and irregular. The outward journey is, in reality, the constant practice of creating gills for oneself since, in the abyss, oxygen is absorbed by organs invented and adapted to live in systemic scarcity and vulnerability.
